Looking back to the year 2022, Wahana Visi Indonesia has been enabled to continue reaching the most vulnerable children and communities because of the improved and controlled COVID-19 pandemic. In the fiscal year 2022, Wahana Visi Indonesia's programs have directly benefited 456,375 people, including 170,781 children and 285,594 adults. Wahana Visi Indonesia's programs are implemented in 15 provinces, 63 districts/cities, 78 sub-districts, and 376 villages.

Collaborating with children in our program areas, their parents and families, community members, and local governments, Wahana Visi Indonesia applied children and communities' transformational development, advocacy, and disaster response approaches. Wahana Visi Indonesia's programs continue to contribute to the well-being of children, especially through protecting girls and boys from violence, improving nutrition for children under five, improving reading skills for primary school children, and creating positive relationships for children in families and communities. The advocacy approach throughout 2022 brought indirect benefits to more than 23 million children through the development of policies to fulfill children's rights and special protection. The disaster response approach enabled Wahana Visi Indonesia to serve children and communities affected by the six disasters that struck Indonesia in 2022.

All the achievements and positive impacts of Wahana Visi Indonesia's programs in 2022 cannot be separated from the role of partners, donors, sponsors, volunteers, and collaboration with the government, civil society organizations, faith-based organizations, and the private sector. Therefore, our deepest gratitude and appreciation for every trust given to us, and especially for the love of caring for children in Indonesia.

Although various predictions of a recession in 2023 and uncertain weather changes are also a challenge for Wahana Visi Indonesia, we welcome the fiscal year 2023 with hope and optimism. \*The composition of Governing Board, Supervisory Board, and Management of Wahana Visi Indonesia in 2022



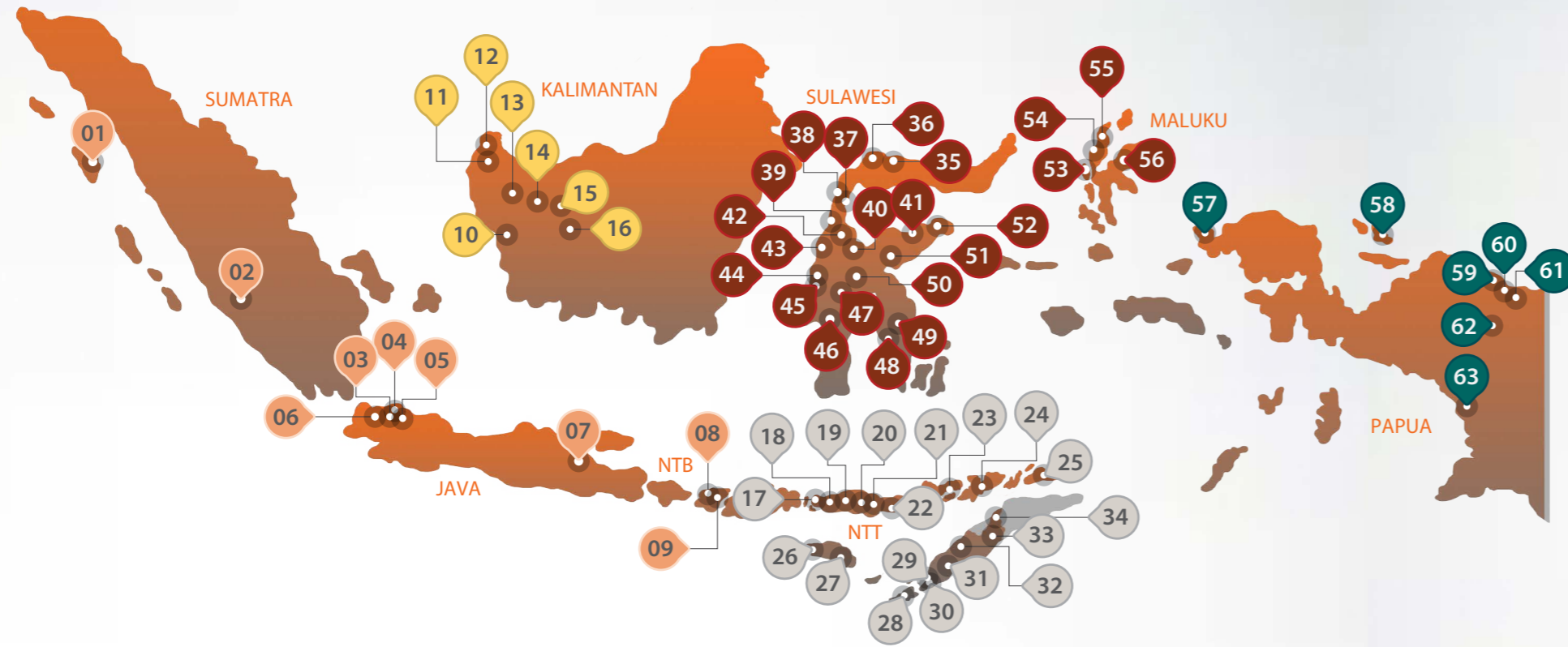
## Wahana Visi Indonesia

Wahana Visi Indonesia is a Christian humanitarian organization dedicated to work and collaborate to empower the most vulnerable children, family and community through community development, advocacy, and emergency response for sustainable transformation regardless of religion, race, ethnic or gender.

In fiscal year 2022, WVI has provided direct benefits to 1,167,779 people, including 236,230 children and 931,549 adults. WVI Programs was implemented in 15 provinces, 63 Area Programs, 78 sub-districts and 376 villages.

This accomplishment was the result of program implementation including Child Protection, Health, Education, Inclusive Economy through transformational development, emergency response and advocacy approaches.

## Child Protection

The Child Protection Sector aims to improve protection for children, girls, and boys from physical and sexual violence. The implementation and approach are to encourage all elements, government and community, adults and children, together to create an environment that protects children from physical and sexual violence.

WVI's child protection programs are conducted **in 5 Provinces and 11 Districts/Cities**, reaching 23,866,397 adult and child indirect beneficiaries, as well as 27,054 direct adult and child beneficiaries (among them 121 adults and children with disabilities).

Implementation of the child protection program includes:

- Strengthening Law and Policy
- Capacity Building of Service Providers
- Social Accountability
- Assistance and Strengthening of Children's Forums
- End Violence against Children (EVAC) Campaign
- Parenting with Love (PDC) Training
- Strengthening Local Child Protection Groups
- Involving religious leaders and traditional leaders in child protection efforts

## Health

In the health sector, WVI implements various programs aimed at ensuring that children under the age of five are well-nourished and avoid stunting (covering three sectors: health, nutrition, drinking water sanitation, and personal hygiene). WVI contributes to the Indonesian government's efforts to accelerate the reduction of stunting, which is a national priority program in the National Medium-Term Development Plan (RPJMN) 2020-2024, as well as the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

WVI's health programs were conducted **in 4 provinces and 15 districts/cities**, reaching 38,183 children (8,901 children aged 0-5 years, 9,179 children aged 6-11 years, and 8,905 children aged 12-18 years old).

Health program implementation includes:

- Infant and Young Child Feeding Program (IYCF)
- Child growth and development monitoring/Posyandu
- Community-based total sanitation (STBM)
- Nutrition post with positive deviance approach
- Nutrition gardens and small livestock
- Provision and management of rural drinking water networks

## Education

WVI's education program focuses on improving children's literacy skills with a Wahana Literasi program model approach.

WVI's education programs are conducted **in 6 provinces and 10 districts/cities**. The education sector has reached 25,289 children and 3,135 adults.

**21 Reading Houses** were built in Papua (Biak and Sentani) with the support of 101 volunteer tutors who regularly accompanying activities with children at the Reading House



**83.78% of teachers** practiced the results of training on Teaching Methods (Pedagogic)



**74.75% of children** have good reading skills in 231 primary schools in 5 districts\*

## Livelihood

Economic programs focus on supporting health programs to help improving the nutritional status of children, improving the quality of life of farmers, and restoring the income of micro, small, and medium enterprises (UMKM) (including ultra-micro) affected by the disaster by ensuring that they are connected to social protection.

The economic program is carried out in **15 WVI-assisted areas** that focus on health and child protection and in **4 disaster response areas** and have direct benefitted 35,034 adults and 10,011 children.

## Policy Advocacy

WVI's advocacy encouraged community participation, including children, in formulating policies related to the fulfillment of child rights and protection.

Advocacy activities in 2022 contributed to 89 policy strengthening (national and local) that have an impact on **23,866,397** vulnerable children in Indonesia.

### Child and community involvement:

- **14 Policies** involves children's contribution to the drafting process
- **54 Policies** involve the contribution of religious/customary leaders in the drafting process

WVI, together with Indonesia Joining Forces (IJF) to End Violence Against Children, conducted policy advocacy to ensure that elements of child protection are included in the Sexual Violence Crime Law (TPKS).

WVI's advocacy also resulted in budget policies in the health and sanitation sectors (health USD 96,665 and sanitation USD 14,756).

The End Violence against Children (EVAC) Campaign had a very positive impact on 70 policy changes.



At the national level, WVI incorporated child protection elements in the Law on Sexual Violence (UU TPKS), Ministerial Regulations on Special Allocation Funds for the Protection of Women and Children, and the National Strategy for the End of Violence Against Children.

End Violence Against Children became the main theme of the supporters' action. There were 26 actions (18,666 supporters) carried out in the 21 WVI-assisted areas, focusing on the issue of sexual violence and child marriage. The forms of action were very diverse, but mostly petition signatures and rallies.

# Emergency Response

During the fiscal year 2022, WVI conducted 6 disaster response programs:

- Second Phase COVID-19 Emergency Response (SCOPE)
- Indonesia COVID-19 Surge Response (ICSR)
- West Kalimantan Flood Emergency Response (WATER)
- North Halmahera Earthquake Emergency Response (NHEER)
- Semeru Pyroclastic Flow Emergency Response (SEPYER)
- Flood Emergency Response Torue (FORTE)

**The total beneficiaries of all these disaster response programs were 711,404 people, of which 9.2% were children.**

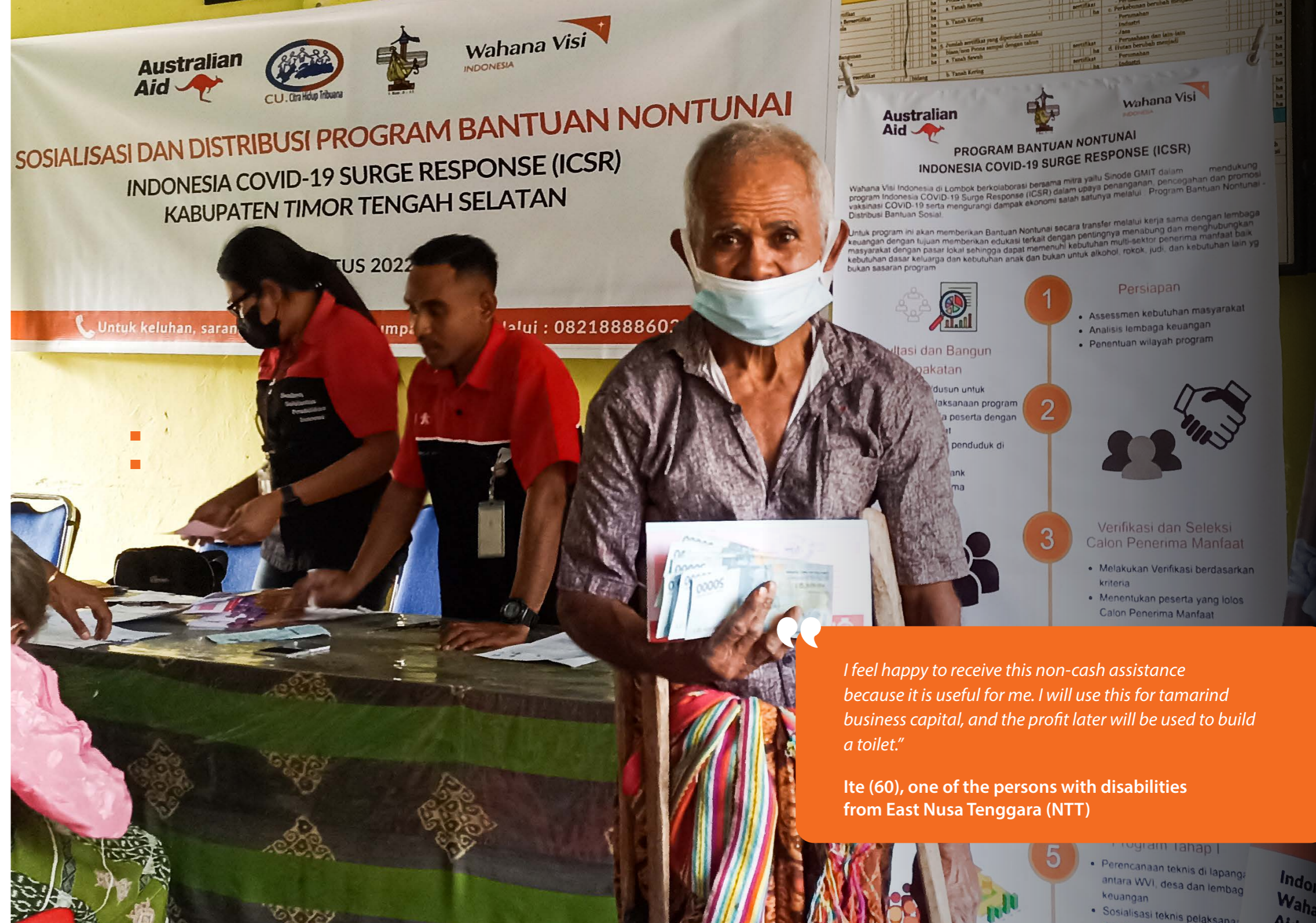

## Disaster Risk Reduction Program and Climate Change Adaptation

In its Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and climate change efforts, WVI ensures that communities have the readiness to reduce and respond to disasters through disaster management documents (DRR action plans and contingencies), increasing the capacity and knowledge of communities in DRR and climate change, as well as increasing the capacity of farmers in coping with the impacts of climate change.

The implementation of WVI's DRR and climate change program in the fiscal year 2022 is reflected through activities:

- Village resilience assessment
- Formation of alert team
- Development of village contingency plans
- School emergency procedures
- Training for alert teams and communities
- Promotion of disaster-resilient families
- Climate change impact mitigation actions

Children and youth are also invited to be actively involved in voicing DRR and climate change actions in national and international forums, as well as optimizing the role of social media in these efforts. Through the SinerGi II and PHINLA projects, children and youth are involved in the International Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction (GPDRR) 2022..

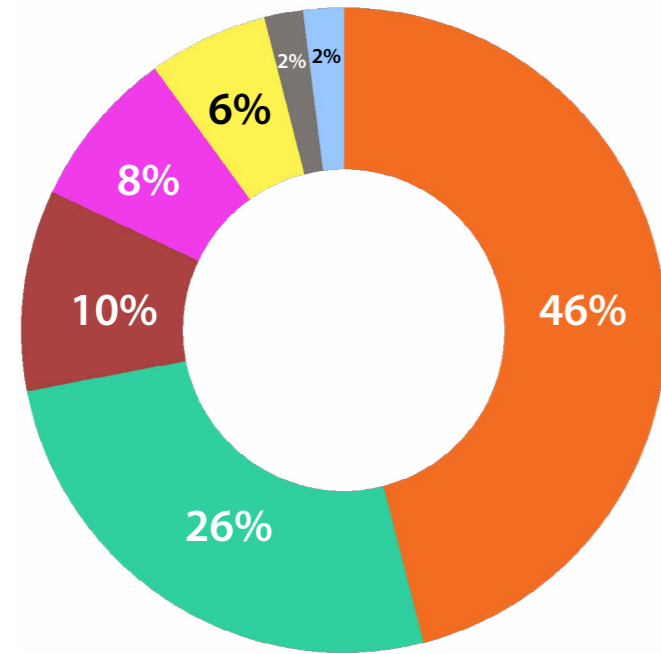

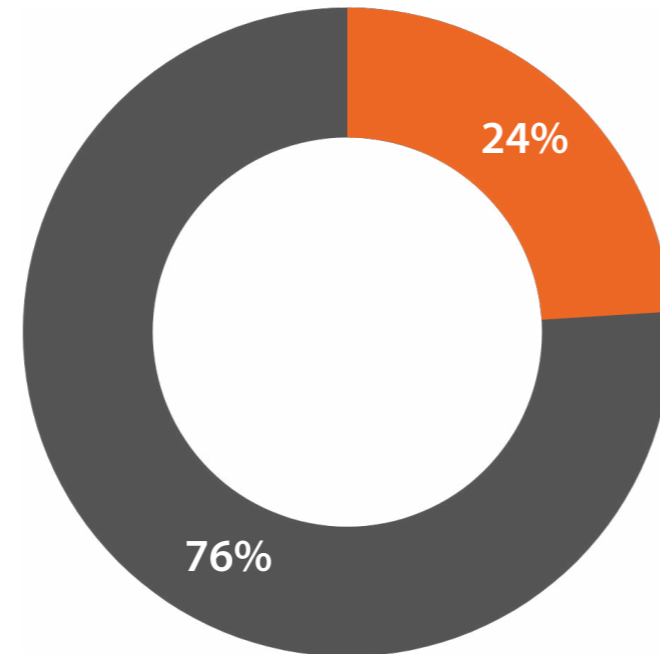
